BALTIMORE ORIOLE (Icterus galbula). Male above, female below. Found in summer in southeastern Canada and eastern two-thirds of the U.S.



BARN SWALLOW (${\it Hirundo\ rustica}$). Found in summer throughout U.S. and western Canada.



BLACK-CAPPED CHICKADEE ($Parus\ atricapillus$). Found year-round in northern half of U.S. and western Canada.



EASTERN BLUEBIRD (Sialia sialis). Summer: southeastern Canada, northeastern and north central U.S. Year-round: southeastern and south central U.S.



BLUE JAY (Cyanocitta cristata). Found year-round in eastern two-thirds of U.S. and southeastern Canada.



BOBWHITE (Colinus virginianus). Male standing, female with chicks. Found year-round in eastern two-thirds (excluding northernmost states) and northwestern corner of U.S.



LEFT: WHITE-BREASTED NUTHATCH (Sitta carolinensis). Year-round through most of U.S. RIGHT: BROWN CREEPER (Certhia familiaris). Summer: southern and western Canada, northern U.S. Winter: eastern two-thirds of U.S. (excluding northernmost states). Year-round: western U.S. and parts of Northeast.



BROWN THRASHER (Toxostoma rufum). Summer: northeastern and north central U.S. Year-round: southeastern U.S.



CANADA GOOSE (Branta canadensis). Winter: southern and western U.S. Migrant throughout U.S. in spring and fall.




CARDINAL (Richmondena cardinalis). Female left, male right. Yearround in most parts of the U.S.



CATBIRD (Dumetella carolinensis). Summer: most of U.S. except West Coast. Winter: extreme southeastern U.S.



CEDAR WAXWING (Bombycilla cedrorum). Male left, female right. Summer: southern Canada and far northern U.S. Winter: southern half of U.S. Year-round: northeastern and north central U.S.




CHIMNEY SWIFT (Chaetura pelagica). Found in summer in eastern half of U.S.




CHIPPING SPARROW (Spizella passerina). Summer: most of Canada and U.S. Year-round: southeastern and southwestern U.S.



COWBIRD (Eastern Cowbird; Brown-headed Cowbird; *Molothrus ater*). Female left, male right. Summer: western Canada and northern half of U.S. Year-round: most of southern half of U.S.



COMMON CROW (Corvus brachyrhynchos). Summer: most of Canada. Year-round: most of U.S.



DOWNY WOODPECKER (Dendrocopus pubescens). Female left, male right. Year-round in most of U.S. and wooded parts of Canada.



FLICKER ($Colaptes\ auratus$). Summer: most of Canada. Year-round: generally, eastern half of U.S.




GOLDFINCH (Common Goldfinch; American Goldfinch; Spinus tristis). Female in center, others male. Found throughout U.S. with seasonal range variation.



GRACKLE (Common Grackle; Purple Grackle; Quiscalus quiscula). Summer: most of southern Canada and northern U.S. Year-round; southeastern quadrant of U.S.



GREEN HERON (Butorides virescens). Found in summer in eastern half of U.S.



HERRING GULL (Larus argentatus). Summer: Canadian far north. Winter: North American coasts. Migrant throughout U.S. and Canada.



HOUSE SPARROW (Passer domesticus). Male left, others female. Yearround throughout U.S. and southern Canada.



HOUSE WREN (Troglodytes aedon). Summer: most of U.S. Winter: Gulf Coast and part of southwestern U.S.




SLATE-COLORED JUNCO (Junco hyemalis). Male in foreground, female in background. Summer: most of Canada. Winter: most of U.S.



ABOVE: KILLDEER (Charadrius vociferus). Summer: southern Canada and northern U.S. Year-round: southern U.S. BELOW: MALLARD (Anas platyrhynchos). Female in foreground, male in background. Summer: most of Canada. Winter: most of U.S.



MOCKINGBIRD (Mimus polyglottos). Year-round in most of U.S. except northwestern and north central states.







MYRTLE WARBLER (Dendroica coronata). Male above, female below. Summer: most of Canada. Winter: generally, southern U.S. Found as migrant in most of U.S.



BELOW: NIGHTHAWK (Chordeiles minor). Found in summer throughout U.S. and Canada. ABOVE: TURKEY VULTURE (Cathartes aura). Summer: northern U.S. Year-round: southern U.S.



PIGEON (Columba livia). Year-round throughout U.S. and in much of Canada.





RED-EYED VIREO (Vireo olivaceus). Found in summer in much of Canada and most of U.S. (not Southwest).




RED-HEADED WOODPECKER (Melanerpes erythrocephalus). Summer: north central U.S. Year-round: most of eastern U.S.



RED-WINGED BLACKBIRD (Agelaius phoeniceus). Male above, others female. Summer: most of Canada and U.S. Year-round: southern half of U.S.



ABOVE: ROBIN (Turdus migratorius). Summer: most of Canada. Yearround: most of U.S. Below: WOOD THRUSH (Hyclocichla mustelina). Found in summer in eastern half of U.S.




RUBY-THROATED HUMMINGBIRD (Archilochus colubris). Male left, female right. Found in summer in eastern half of U.S.




SONG SPARROW (Melospiza melodia). Summer: most of Canada. Winter: southern U.S. Year-round: northern U.S.





STARLING (Sturnus vulgaris). Summer: southern Canada. Year-round: throughout U.S.



TOWHEE (Pipilo erythrophthalmus). Male above, female below. Found in most of the U.S. most of the year.

WHITE-CROWNED SPARROW (Zonotrichia leucophrys). Summer: northern and western Canada. Winter: southern U.S. Year-round: U.S. West Coast and west central states. Migrant in eastern Canada and northeastern U.S.




EASTERN WOOD PEWEE (${\it Contopus\ virens}$). Found in summer in eastern half of U.S. and parts of southeastern Canada.




YELLOWTHROAT (Geothlypis trichas). Male above, female below. Summer: most of Canada and U.S. Year-round: southernmost states of U.S.

Everyone can recognize the bright Cardinal by its brilliant scarlet plumage or the Blue Jay by its equally striking azure, black and white coloration. But how many can quickly identify the Bobwhite, the Myrtle Warbler or the Red-Eved Vireo? Few of us, yet they are far from rare. Like most of the dozens of birds in this book, they may be easily and frequently spotted in or near cities and towns in most parts of the United States and Canada.

Become familiar with all of these common yet beautiful species through these 46 large, lifelike drawings.
